#### **Division receives ChemLuminary Award**

The Division was presented with a ChemLuminary Award for Local Section Activities in 2011 for its outreach efforts associated with the International Year of Chemistry. Division Secretary Anna Cavinato is shown at the top of the next page with the Division's ChemLuminary Poster. The activity recognized by the ChemLuminary award was the Division's invitation to student sections to submit grants up to \$500 each to support activities that would communicate the significance of analytical chemistry for one or more of the IYC themes of environment, energy, materials, and



health. Twenty grants were awarded - ten to graduate institutions and ten to predominantly

undergraduate institutions. A wide variety of projects were supported, including public lectures, outreach projects to local schools, and environmental projects to study water quality.

#### **National Awards**

Nick Winograd was honored as the recipient of the 2012 ACS Award in Analytical Chemistry, sponsored by the Battelle Memorial Institute on. The award is presented to a scientist who has made an outstanding contribution to analytical chemistry, with special consideration given to independence of thought and originality or (to paraphrase the official description) importance to humanity. The ACS award in Chromatography, sponsored by Supelco/Sigma-Aldrich, was presented to Wolfgand Lindner as part of an all-day event on Sunday, August 19. This award is presented to a scientist who has made an outstanding contribution to the fields of chromatography with particular consideration given to developments of new methods. Scott McLuckey received this years Frank H. Field and Joe L. Franklin Award for Outstanding Achievements in Mass spectrometry which awarded to outstanding achievement in either the development or the application of mass spectrometry.

#### **Undergraduate Analytical Research Poster Presentations**

The Division awarded certificates to undergraduates who presented posters of analytical nature at the ACS fall national meeting in Philadelphia. Seventeen certificates were presented to students who participated in the poster session organized by the Division and twenty-two to those who participated in the Undergraduate Poster Session sponsored by the Division of Chemical Education. # A Report from the Executive Committee meeting

The Executive Committee met at the ACS national meeting in Philadelphia on Tuesday August 21, 2012 from 3:00 to 6:00 pm at the College of Physicians of Philadelphia. The meeting started with a report from Cindy Larive, Program Chair, highlighting the meeting program. A rich array of symposia, contributed sessions and poster sessions were underway with eight sessions being recorded for later broadcasting on the ACS website. Incoming Program Chair, Thom Rossi, described programming for PittCon 2013 and the Spring ACS National Meeting in New Orleans. These programs are shaping up and a suggestion was made to identify presiders for contributed sessions that would help recruit speakers.

Chair David Koppenaal summarized the outcomes of the strategic planning meeting that took place on Sunday August 19. Two topics emerged as priority: programming and membership/recruiting. The Division envisions strengthening programming by identifying local program coordinators several years in advance. Committees with similar functions will be merged so to operate more effectively. Retaining members continues to be a challenge and a Member Activities committee was proposed that would strengthen recruiting efforts and plan social activities.

Division awards were discussed. Most awardees receive their awards at the fall meeting but they should have the option to decide which meeting to receive the award. The EC was reminded that Division award nominations would be due on November 1<sup>st</sup>.

Secretary Anna Cavinato reported election results. About 12.5% of the membership participated in the election. She also shared a report card developed for the Division by ACS with statistical information about the performance of the Division over the last five years.

Treasurer Al Ribes reviewed the current and proposed budget. An expected deficit of \$34,000 was predicted largely due to increased activities in 2013 for the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations. A discussion followed to solicit sponsors to support social events.

The Subdivision of Chromatography and Separation Science was represented by Brian Bidlingmeyer. He proposed to the Division that a line be added to the Young Investigator Award sponsored by Agilent "in memory of Walter Jennings." The Executive Board voted unanimously to accept this change.

Committees reports included Awards Canvassing (Thom Rossi), Nominating (Sue Lunte), Newsletter (Faye Rubinson, new editor), and Web (Roland Hirsch). Rick Kelly, representing the Analytical Sciences Digital Library (ASDL) presented a summary of ASDL activities and a budget proposal for 2013. It was suggested that ASDL becomes a committee within the Division structure.

Reports were also presented by FACSS delegates Bonner Denton and Charles Wilkins and EAS delegate Brian Bidlingmeyer.

The meeting concluded with an extensive discussion of events and celebrations for the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. A special edition of *Analytical Chemistry* was proposed by editor Jonathan Sweedler.



# SUE LUNTE RECEIVES HIGUCHI-KU AWARD

Sue Lunte has been named one of the recipients of Kansas's most prestigious recognition for scholarly excellence: the Higuchi-KU Endowment Research Achievement Awards. The awards were established in 1981 and recognize the exceptional long-term research accomplishments of faculty at Kansas Board of Regents universities. Sue is the recipient of the Dolph Simons Award in Biomedical Sciences. She is director of the Ralph N. Adams Institute for Bioanalytical Chemistry and director of the recently

announced COBRE Center for the Molecular Analysis of Disease Pathways, funded by the National Institutes of Health. She came to KU in 1987 as an assistant scientist in the Center for Bioanalytical Research, becoming its director in 1994 and a faculty member in 1995. Her academic background includes a bachelor of arts from Kalamazoo College and a doctorate from Purdue University.

# Applications for Awards for Undergraduate Research Now Open

Applications are invited for the 2013 I. M. Kolthoff Award for undergraduate research in analytical chemistry. The I.M. Kolthoff Award is given annually to deserving undergraduates who have done undergraduate research in the field of analytical chemistry, broadly defined, in celebration of the life and accomplishments of the late Professor Izaak Maurits Kolthoff, viewed by

many as the father of modern analytical chemistry. The Kolthoff awards provide travel funding up to \$750 for undergraduate students to present a poster on their undergraduate research this year at either PITTCON 2013 (March 17 - March 21, 2013; Philadelphia, PA) or the Spring ACS National Meeting & Exposition (April 7-11, 2013; New Orleans, LA). The deadline for submission of completed applications for the 2013 competition will be **December 1, 2012**. ## 2013-2014 Kolthoff Graduate Fellowship Program

The ACS Division of Analytical Chemistry is currently inviting student applications for its 2013-2014 Graduate Fellowship Program. This year, the division is moving to online applications, making the application process easier for students and for those submitting recommendations. The Kolthoff Awards Program, now in its 65<sup>th</sup> year, provides both nine-month and summer (three-month) fellowships to promising analytical chemistry graduate students to support their thesis research. The current stipend levels are \$21,000 for the nine-month fellowships and \$7,000 for the three-month summer fellowships. # FACSS welcomes three international societies as new member organizations

The Federation of Analytical Chemistry and Spectroscopy Societies (FACSS) is pleased to announce that at their recent Governing Board meeting in March three new member organizations, namely the AES Electrophoresis Society, the Spectroscopical Society of Japan (SpSJ), and the North American Society for Laser Induced Breakdown Spectroscopy NASLIBS), have been accepted to the federation as full member organizations. The Federation of Analytical Chemistry and Spectroscopy Societies (FACSS) is an organization designed to further the interests of analytical chemistry and spectroscopy on behalf of its member organizations. In 1973, FACSS was founded as a federation of member organizations for the exchange of ideas at the forefront of analytical sciences. Over the last thirty nine years FACSS has pursued five critical objectives to realize the Federation's goals: A. Education and Training,

B. Advancement of Knowledge, C. Advancement of Technology, D. Social and Professional Peer Networking, and E. Promotion / Enabling of Interests of Member Organizations.

With the addition of the AES Electrophoresis Society, the Spectroscopical Society of Japan (SpSJ), and the North American Society for Laser Induced Breakdown Spectroscopy (NASLIBS), to the federation's existing member organizations [Division of Analytical Chemistry of the American Chemical Society, American Society for Mass Spectrometry (ASMS), ANACHEM, the Coblentz Society, the International Society for Automation (ISA) – Analysis Division, the Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC) Analytical Division, and the Society for Applied Spectroscopy (SAS)], FACSS is now 10-member societies strong. This expansion reflects a unique element of FACSS and its annual North American meeting, SciX, in that all areas and aspects of analytical chemistry and spectroscopy are welcome, bringing together leading scientists from among many disciplines for **scientific exchange**. FACSS believes that the addition of these three member organizations will enhance its ability to serve the analytical chemistry and spectroscopy
